

2010 Annual Report

Our twentieth anniversary year was a resounding success – with six informative regular programs and an additional special Genealogy Day in October. We also enhanced our partnership with the Bartholomew County Public Library, which is

helping us with publicity, and we continued to communicate information of genealogical interest to the membership. In addition, we did some benchmarking of other area genealogical societies to identify best practices, and we conducted a survey of our own members. Survey results have helped us identify many topics of interest to guide our programming, and we are pleased that many of you have volunteered to help with various activities as we move ahead. (Potential volunteers can expect to hear more from us in 2011.)

In 2010 BCGS was enriched not only by the expertise of our speakers but by the participation of our members. We are truly a community of learners. Although the availability of internet databases has changed much about how we do genealogical research, the reasons for doing that research remain unchanged, and the BCGS mission is as relevant today as it was in 1990. So – here's to beginning our third decade of genealogical inquiry. The quest continues!

Membership

Membership chair Sarah Bush has taken the lead in contacting and recruiting members as well as keeping addresses and emails up to date. As of November 30, 2010, we had sixty-one members, including seventeen life members. 2010 Programs

Vice President Jane Johnson coordinated the following slate of programs in 2010.

January 23: Jason Hatton, Library Services Manager, led us through a fascinating and useful program on the "Basics of Digital Photo Editing – Tools, Tips, and Techniques." Jason, a regular and popular contributor to our programs, will appear again in 2011.

March 27: Genealogist Donna Kuhlman gave us a look at local history by describing "Old Towns and Roads in Bartholomew County – How They Developed, Why They did (or didn't) Last." Donna showed us maps of early roads developed from the south along with settlements and trade routes. Extra input from knowledgeable members provided additional information. A bonus in this meeting was member Bill Chisman's sharing a mammoth and comprehensive chart of his family history going back several centuries.

May 22: At the invitation of the Jackson County History Center and Museum of Genealogical Research, we traveled to Brownstown, which boasts a library that is a virtual goldmine for genealogists. Members of the Jackson County Center graciously opened the museum for us, described its abundant holdings and then turned us loose to pursue our individual interests. It was an enlightening day coordinated by Jennie Rauch.

July 24: Our pitch-in picnic and sharing session, hosted by Jane Johnson and Mary Hermanson, combined delicious food with the opportunity for the exchange of materials and good ideas from members who described resources that had been especially helpful to them in their research.

September 18: BCGS member and genealogist Kathy Charlton shared her thirty years of experience in researching family history through English records. Our meeting room was filled to capacity – evidence that there is a lot of interest in this topic. We expect to do more with British Isles research in 2011.

October 23: "Uncovering Genealogical Gems" was the title for our Genealogy Day, which featured three outstanding speakers: Member Mary Ellen Grossman describing resources available through the Bartholomew County Courthouse; Bartholomew County Historical Society Executive Director Julie Hughes giving us tips for identifying, preserving and using old photographs; and renowned genealogist Ron Darrah of Indianapolis providing sources and methods for learning about ancestors' military service. The forty-six attendees enjoyed a delicious luncheon prepared by Sarah Bush, Jennie Rauch, Mary Beth Glick, Karen Loy, and Carolyn Wheeler. We do not plan to have a full-day "Genealogy Day" featuring three outside speakers in 2011. Instead, we have invited notable outside speakers to speak in some of our regular programs.

November 20: We closed the year by inviting all founding members in the area to join us to elect 2011 officers and celebrate our twentieth anniversary – with refreshments. Karen Loy provided the cake and Carolyn Wheeler the punch. Both were delicious – and even more so was the feeling of fellowship as we newer members enjoyed the recollections of those who were with BCGS at the beginning.

United Way Fire and BCGS

Unfortunately, approximately 350 copies of the Family Histories book stored in the basement of the United Way Building on Thirteenth Street were lost due to water damage associated with the catastrophic fire there on Christmas Eve 2009. However, I am pleased to report that governing documents, bound meeting minutes, and treasurers' reports from our first ten years, survived, since they had been removed during a visit by Donna Kuhlman, Jane Johnson, and me a few weeks before the fire. We also saved the Betty Liebert papers and more than twenty Family Histories books. So, while we regret the loss of so many of our books, we are grateful to have retained some books as well as records of the early years of BCGS.

Looking ahead to 2011

Jane Johnson, who served as Vice President during 2010, did not stand for reelection to office due to assuming other responsibilities. Over her years on the board, Jane kept us abreast of developments in the larger genealogical research community as well as researching and conducting entertaining and informative programs. We thank her for her service and look forward to seeing her in 2011.

Replacing Jane as Vice President will be Jennie Rauch, who has distinguished herself during her two years as Secretary by her willingness to go the extra mile to get things done. Our 2011 Secretary will be Carolyn Wheeler, who joined BCGS at the end of 2009, having moved to Columbus from Kokomo, where she was an active member of the Howard County Genealogical Society.

Continuing in their roles will be Kim Ray, Newsletter Editor, Sarah Bush, Treasurer and Membership Chairman, and Donna Kuhlman and Karen Loy, Genealogists. Kim, a talented graphic artist, has brought her talents to bear on Ancestors, giving it a new look and making it available on-line. For the third year, Kim also designed eye-catching "posters" for Genealogy Day publicity. In her dual role, Sarah has kept us on track with careful monitoring of our finances and membership lists as well as preparing our annual surname list. Sarah has also been a consistent source of creative ideas for our society's development and continuous improvement. Donna and Karen carry on our society's mission of helping others gather genealogical information through responding to requests from the Ancestry.com bulletin board for Bartholomew County (Donna) and Random Acts of Genealogical Kindness (Karen). Their research efforts have yielded some entertaining stories both in Ancestors and at our Board meetings as well as giving us the opportunity to learn from their detailed descriptions of research methods. In addition, Donna has taken on responsibility for checking and refining the information gathered in 2009 for our Garland Brook Service Project. Because we gathered so much information, this has turned out to be a much more demanding task than we had imagined.

In closing, I want to thank each of you for your membership and participation in BCGS this year. We welcome your suggestions and look forward to involving more of you in our activities in 2011.



Member Jim Lower Traces White Creek Settlement History

BCGS member Jim Lower has produced a fascinating compilation of genealogical and historical documents relating to the **White Creek** area of Bartholomew County. Jim created the project for BCGS members both to provide more information about White Creek and to identify sources of data available to researchers interested in further inquiry. The book is lavishly illustrated with photographs, genealogical charts, and maps.

Jim begins his history of the community by introducing four **Columbus High School** graduates from the **Class of 1944**, **Ruth Aldenhagen**, **Victor Behrman**, **Norman Bogie**, and **Ruth Beshear**, who appeared on the same page of the yearbook, the **Log**. Realizing that these four had a heritage linked to the White Creek Community, Jim decided to highlight their common origins, especially the **Kreinhagen** and **Tobrocke** families. These related families (and many others in the community) migrated to Bartholomew County in the mid-nineteenth century from the **Kingdom of Hannover**, now mostly a part of the modern German state of Lower Saxony. These pioneers carved out a new life in the Indiana "wilderness" while retaining much of their heritage, especially their religious traditions.

The book focuses on the people who migrated from the Hannover villages of **Engter**, **Kalkriese**, and **Venne**, just northeast of the city of Osnabrück. Because the genealogical "well" generally runs dry here in the early 1700's, Jim's narration continues through the history of the region, extending back to the famous **Varus Disaster**, where the Romans suffered one of their worst defeats about 9 A.D. Jim then describes the Saxon ancestors who later arrived in the region and their earlier origins in what is now Denmark. Reaching back even further into "*the mists of time*", Jim's

commentary outlines the common origins of most Europeans from homelands in central Asia.

Because of his own roots among the White Creek families, Jim was able to draw on his genealogical research in identifying the common ancestry of the four 1944 graduates. This is a great example of using one's own knowledge to benefit others and should be an inspiration to many of us.

Jim's project is titled **Four 1944 Graduates of Columbus High School: "Who Did They Think They Were?"** – an allusion to the 2010 NBC series on genealogy. **Who Do You Think You Are?** Eventually it may be placed in the library, but for now it is available for sharing. Highlights

Our special October 23 Genealogy Day found 46 attendees - a record number in quite a while - enjoying a variety of speakers' topics. Mary Ellen Grossman invited us to the County Clerk's office any time, Monday through Friday, 8 am - 5 pm (lunch is 11:30 - 12:30), for help locating records of marriage, divorce, birth, probate, estray and more, starting from 1821. She is in the rear of the building and really wants to help if at all possible. Finding tax records can sometimes catch folks who were missed in the 1850 census, since everyone pays taxes! She also noted the name you think you are looking for may have been Americanized when docking, so keep an open mind when searching!

Julie Hughes brought some fragile treasures from the Bartholomew County Historical Society. She showed us how the type of photo (daguerrotype, tintype or ambrotype) might help pinpoint the date it was taken. Also watch for clues in hair and clothing styles! Tight sleeves, puffy sleeves, bustles, etc., all had their day. Stop by and let her help you date your pictures!

Ron Darrah's military experience helped him explain some of the unique practices that can help locate your ancestor's records. Even career military had a relatively narrow timeframe of service, and each event - enlistment, promotion, re-enlistment, discharge, had separate paperwork. Specialized training? Separate paperwork! Awards? More separate paperwork! Be sure to check out the site wardepartmentpapers.org, as well as Red Cross or YMCA archives!

At November's Annual Meeting, we not only elected 2011 officers, but also celebrated the organization's 20th Anniversary! Margot Green will continue as President. Jennie Rauch will be Vice President. Sarah Bush will continue as Treasurer, and Carolyn Wheeler will be Secretary. It was motioned, seconded and voted upon to donate a copy of our purple Family History book to the Hope Library, as well as a note inside if folks would like to purchase a new copy for themselves or as a gift.

When business was completed, we enjoyed cake and punch, and shared memories of the Society's early days as well as favorite Holiday traditions. Jane Johnson brought copies of an old favorite cookie recipe for everyone. She reminded us that Rubbermaid type containers are not necessarily waterproof if upended or submerged! She suggested keeping duplicates of important papers and pictures in a lockbox or at another family member's home for safekeeping. Donna Kuhlman reported a book salvaged from the United Way fire/flood survived quite well in the freezer! When she retrieved it recently, it was obviously damaged, but readable!

Only four of the 21 invited Founding Members were able to come to our celebration. Thanks to Ron, Donna, Karen Loy and Imogene Weisner for sharing some of the fun stories of their diligent efforts to organize and become a viable group. Ron Bulhuis told of first President John Hamblen's meticulous paperwork and attention to detail as a legacy to all of us today. He said he thinks John would be tickled to see that we are still in existence and going strong!

The new version of family search (beta testing) is now available at the home page familysearch.org. While there are now many more records available for searching, the 100-plus how-to articles and more than 40,000 useful articles are also a great contribution for supporting your family research.

"The Allen County Public Library in Fort Wayne, Indiana has launched a new genealogy web site. The aim is to make it easier for people to find out about their family ancestry without actually visiting the library's Genealogy Center.

The new web site, located at www.genealogycenter.org, includes several free databases and portals including the African American Gateway, Family Bible Records and Our Military Heritage that have been developed by the Genealogy Center.

The Genealogy Center's website includes other resources, including full-text books that have been digitized by Internet Archives, the Center's Pathfinders to various areas of research, and the Community Album, a collection of historical photographs for the surrounding area.

Perhaps the most valuable online service of all is the "Ask a Librarian" section. As stated on the new web site, "Uncertain whether we have a record you're seeking? Need a quick pointer on what to do next in your research? Ask a Genealogy Librarian and get a quick response. Answers to your questions about our catalogs, collections, databases, programs and other services are just an email away. Contact us at Genealogy@ACPL.Info for additional information about The Genealogy Center or a quick pointer to help you advance your research. We'll make every effort to respond to your general queries within 48 hours."

The Fred J. Reynolds Historical Genealogy Department, located in the Main Library Branch of the Allen County Public Library, is the second-largest genealogy department in North America. It is home to more than 350,000 printed volumes and 513,000 items of microfilm and microfiche. Only the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, a private institution, is larger."

Karen's Random Acts of Genealogical Kindness

Last Veteran Of Civil War In County Taken

**Andrew J. Hunter Dies
This Afternoon, Two
Weeks After Daughter.**

RECENTLY PASSED 96

*Native of Newbern
Enlisted When Only 16
—Unwounded in Many
Battles.*

Andrew Jackson Hunter, 96, this county's last surviving veteran of the Civil war, died at 1 o'clock this afternoon at his home at 1234 Franklin street.

His death followed by two weeks that of Mrs. Gladys Rigby, the daughter with whom he had lived since coming to Columbus from Indianapolis 15 years ago.

She died the day before he observed his 96th birthday on April 12.

The funeral will be held Thursday at Newbern, but

arrangements had not been completed this afternoon.

Mr. Hunter left no close relatives. Married twice, both wives are dead and no children are living.

Survivors include three step-grandchildren in Indianapolis, a nephew in Batesville, a nephew, David Huffer, and niece, Mrs. Laura Biddinger, here, and a great-niece, Mrs. Ralph N Doup of this city, who recently was appointed his guardian.

Enlists When Only 16.

Mr. Hunter's parents were Joseph and Sarah Hunter, who moved from the neighborhood of Shelby, KY, to Newbern, where their son was born April 12, 1845.

At the age of 16, Mr. Hunter enlisted Sept. 17, 1861, at Newbern for service in the Civil war, and was mustered in at Madison as private in Company G, Sixth Indiana Volunteer infantry.

This is said to have been the first regiment raised in Indiana expressly for service in the Civil war.

Mr. Hunter served for a time under Maj. Gus

Abbett, who organized Company D of the 67th Indiana infantry, recruited here.

After he had completed his first 3-year enlistment, he reenlisted Jan 30, 1865, in Columbus as a member of Company H, 145th Indiana infantry. He ended his service as a sergeant Jan 21, 1866, at Macon, Ga.

Never Wounded or Ill.

Mr. Hunter survived a number of the major engagements of the war, including Shiloh, Stone River, Siege of Corinth, Liberty Gap, Lookout Mountain, Missionary Ridge, Buzzards' Rooste, Kenesaw Mountain and the Siege of Atlanta.

In all his campaigning, he never was wounded and never sick enough to go to the hospital.

Mr. Hunter moved here from Indianapolis to live with Mrs. Rigby about 15 years ago. Before that he had lived in Winchester.

Two Comrades Depart.

When he came to Columbus there were 18 Civil war veterans still living here. Recently there were three, but William A.

Abbett died and William C. Kerr moved to Edinburg.

He was an honorary member of the G.A.R. here, and also was made an honorary member of the United Spanish War Veterans.

He originally belonged to the G.A.R. post at Winchester but transferred his membership to an Indianapolis post later.

In his younger years, Mr Hunter was a ditcher, well-digger and farmer at Newbern.

A brother, Lee Hunter, who was a Civil war veteran, is buried at Newbern.


